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Below please find the Murphy office update on COVID-19.

Here's what you need to know today, July 10th:

- As cases continue to spike in other parts of the country, Governor Ned Lamont announced that Connecticut will pause its reopening plan and remain in the current phase. The Hartford Courant provided a rundown of what is open and what remains closed.
- Governor Lamont <u>announced</u> that he is reinstating the Small Town Economic Assistance Program (STEAP) – a state initiative that funds infrastructure improvement projects for towns that are otherwise ineligible to receive urban action bonds. To accomplish this, the governor is opening a new round of grants totaling \$15 million. Restoring this program, which has been inactive since 2016, will provide much needed support to towns during a period of fiscal insecurity caused by the pandemic.
- Residents of long term care facilities and their families can access information about their rights through the State Long Term Care Ombudsman Program here.
 Each Wednesday at 5:30pm, CT's Ombudsman Mairead Painter hosts a Facebook Live for residents and family members to ask questions and hear the latest guidance for those living and working at these facilities. You can learn more by clicking here.
- Today, the CT Congressional delegation <u>called on</u> the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) to reverse its decision to prohibit shellfish aquaculture from being eligible for direct payments through the Coronavirus Food Assistance Program (CFAP) at USDA. In a <u>letter</u> to U.S. Secretary of Agriculture Sonny Perdue, the lawmakers noted the CARES Act allows shellfish agriculture to receive funding through USDA, and allowing additional resources to shellfish farmers will help weather the storm due to COVID-19.
- The National Institutes of Health launched a website for those interested in volunteering for Phase 3 efficacy trials for the prevention of COVID-19.
 Registration and participation are strictly voluntary. Learn more by clicking here.
- As of this week, all campgrounds at Connecticut State Parks have opened for the 2020 season. Due to the pandemic and to help maintain social distancing, all campers are required to make reservations in advance of their stay. Walk-in campers will not be permitted this season. Campers are also reminded to wear a face covering when coming into their office to check in for their reserved campsite. For more information about the operations of state campgrounds and to

- Governor Lamont today announced that the Connecticut Department of Public
 Health has selected Mathematica Policy Research to conduct an independent,
 third-party review of the response to COVID-19 within the state's nursing homes
 and assisted living facilities. Last month, the governor announced that he was
 ordering the review to be conducted and soon thereafter proposals were solicited
 from third-party experts. Mathematica is expected to provide the state with a final
 report of its findings by the end of September. The analysis will be made available
 to the public.
- ICYMI: As coronavirus cases nationwide surge to record levels, Senator Murphy and Senator Blumenthal joined their Democratic colleagues in a letter demanding Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell bring the House-passed Health and Economic Recovery Omnibus Emergency Solutions Act, or the HEROES Act, to the Senate floor before the chamber recessed last week.
