Below please find the Murphy office update on COVID-19.

Here's what you need to know this week:

- Today, Senator Murphy and Senator Blumenthal <u>renewed their call for Congress</u>
 <u>to pass a COVID-19 relief bill</u> at a press conference in Hartford. The Senators
 stressed the need for additional federal funding to help families, workers, health
 care professionals and small businesses suffering due to the pandemic.
- Governor Ned Lamont <u>announced</u> that Connecticut is the first state in the nation to provide a learning device to every PK-12 student in need, achieving a major milestone in the fight to close the K-12 digital divide in Connecticut, particularly as many schools moved toward remote learning during the COVID-19 pandemic.
- Following his <u>roundtable listening session with restaurant owners in Connecticut</u>, Senator Murphy <u>published an op-ed in the Hartford Courant</u> on Small Business Saturday calling on people in Connecticut to continue supporting small businesses and laying out what the federal government can do to make sure our businesses stay afloat.
- Murphy <u>visited Bristol Community Health Center</u> to thank health care workers and encourage CT residents to continue following public health guidance like wearing a mask, practicing social distancing and avoiding large gatherings.
- Senator Murphy and Senator Blumenthal joined 12 of their colleagues in a letter
 led by Senator Amy Klobuchar of Minnesota in urging the National Institute of
 Mental Health (NIMH) to prioritize efforts to study and understand the impact of
 the pandemic on the mental health of children and young
 adults. Recent reports have highlighted a substantial increase in anxiety and
 depression among children and young adults since the beginning of the
 pandemic—with one study finding that nearly one-third of high school students
 surveyed reported feeling unhappy or depressed in recent months.
- Senator Murphy joined a bipartisan letter with 49 of his Senate colleagues in calling for the expansion of access to telehealth services for Medicare beneficiaries during the COVID-19 pandemic to be made permanent. In their letter, the lawmakers highlight the growing use and benefits of telehealth during the ongoing coronavirus pandemic, as patients seek to avoid traveling to hospitals and other providers and instead receive care at home. New data shows that the

- number of Medicare beneficiaries using telehealth services in late April increased by over 13,000 percent relative to a week of services before the pandemic.
- Governor Ned Lamont announced that 154 nonprofit arts organizations in
 <u>Connecticut will be receiving \$9 million in grants</u> this month under a program
 <u>initiated by his administration</u> to provide support to the state's arts community
 amid the impact of the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic. Qualifying organizations will
 receive a base grant of \$5,000. For organizations that have raised funds between
 March 10 and November 1, 2020, the program will offer a supplemental match of
 up to 50 percent of contributed income during that period. The program uses
 federal CARES Act funding from the state's Coronavirus Relief Fund.
- REMINDER: the enrollment period for farmers to apply to Coronavirus Food
 Assistance Program 2 (CFAP 2) ends next week on Friday, December 11th. This
 program provides direct relief to producers facing market disruptions and
 associated costs because of COVID-19.
- ICYMI: PURA has extended the enrollment period for programs to prevent heat source shut-offs for both residential and non-residential customers through at least February 9, 2021. Further, the Winter Protection Program, which protects eligible households during the winter months, is also in effect from November 1, 2020 through May 1, 2021. If you are experiencing difficulty paying your utility bill, you can contact your utility company and ask if you are eligible to be "coded hardship" and enrolled in the Winter Protection Program. If you are ineligible for hardship status or a non-residential customer, ask to enroll in a COVID-19 Payment Plan.
