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Below please find the Murphy office update on COVID-19.

Here's what you need to know this week:

- On October 8th, Connecticut officially moved into Phase 3 of reopening. Phase 3 changes include increasing the capacity of indoor and outdoor events and the ability for indoor performing arts venues to reopen at 50 percent capacity. <u>Click here to see a full list of Phase 3 changes</u>. Everyone is encouraged to continue following public health recommendations including wearing a mask, washing hands and social distancing when appropriate.
- This week, Senator Murphy launched a campaign inviting people across Connecticut to share their health care stories and describe how they would be impacted if the Republican lawsuit to overturn the Affordable Care Act succeeds. Murphy launched this story share campaign as a way to highlight what's at stake if Republicans confirm Judge Amy Coney Barrett for the United States Supreme Court, and the Affordable Care Act is struck down in the middle of the COVID-19 pandemic. - Senator Murphy <u>visited Tangen Biosciences</u>, a biotech company in Branford working on a flu/COVID-19 panel that can detect Flu A, Flu B, and COVID-19 simultaneously in a single test. Last month, Senator Murphy named the company as his "Innovator of the Month."
- Senator Murphy and Senator Blumenthal <u>held a series of roundtables this week</u> in Connecticut with elected officials, health care advocates and constituents with pre-existing health conditions, highlighting what's at stake for the 1.5 million Americans in Connecticut with pre-existing health conditions when the Supreme Court hear the White-House supported Affordable Care Act lawsuit this November.
- Governor Lamont announced that his administration is <u>dedicating \$2.6 million of</u> <u>Connecticut's Coronavirus Relief Funds to support the state's public libraries</u> as they continue to make health and safety improvements and offer more services to residents amid the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic.
- As COVID-19 cases rise across the country, Senator Murphy visited two COVID-19 testing sites this week in <u>East Hartford</u> and <u>New Haven</u> to encourage residents get tested for COVID-19, continue to practice health guidelines and call on the U.S. Senate to pass a COVID-19 relief bill to bring additional testing funding to

communities across Connecticut. COVID-19 testing is free, and widely available across the state.
