## VIII. <u>REPORT OF TOWN MANAGER</u>

Town Manager Lee presented and discussed the following topics:

#### • ESCO Update

In November, the Town solicited proposals for "Energy-Savings Performance Contracting" for Town-owned buildings. Johnson Controls of Rocky Hill submitted the only proposal. Their proposal was reviewed by the Capital Projects Building Committee on January 23<sup>rd</sup>.

Johnson Controls has proposed to make energy savings improvements to several town and school buildings. The estimated cost of these improvements after rebates is \$3.86M. The estimated payback from the energy savings is 10.3 years.

If the Town goes forward with the project the energy savings would be guaranteed by Johnson Controls. The estimated energy savings are in excess of \$300,000 per year. The savings would be

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The Building Committee requested that Johnson Controls meet with Town Facilities staff to further refine the scope of the project. No commitments have been made at this time. No action by the Town Council is required at this time as well.

# • Wheeler School Project Update

The plans for the renovation of Wheeler Elementary School are being finalized. Meetings have been held with the School Facilities Unit of the Department of Administrative Services to discuss grant reimbursements for the project. D.A.S. has indicated that, if it was approved at referendum before June 30, 2017, the project would be eligible under the current authorized grant reimbursement rate of 65.36%. A tentative referendum date of Tuesday, June 6<sup>th</sup> is being considered at this time. It is anticipated that the school project reimbursement rates could dramatically decrease with the new FY18 state budget.

A special meeting of the Capital Projects Building Committee is being scheduled for Thursday, February 23<sup>rd</sup> to hear a presentation from O&G and KBA regarding the proposed project. Town Council and Board of Education members will be invited to attend this meeting.

At this meeting the proposed design and estimated cost of the project will be presented. The location of the meeting is yet to be determined.

Members of the public are welcomed to attend this meeting as well.

# • Railroad Meeting Update

Town staff met with Pan Am and State Officials to review the seven rail crossings in Plainville. Those attending the meeting included two representatives from Pan Am, 6 from the State D.O.T., Representative Bill Petit, State Senator Henri Martin, Police Chief Matt Catania, Town Engineer John Bossi, several other Town staff and Town Manager Lee.

D.O.T. staff indicated that funds are currently available to make some improvements to the warning devices at several of the crossings. Critical crossings identified during the meeting included Broad Street, Town Line Road and West Main Street.

As a result of this meeting, D.O.T. will begin a detailed analysis of all of the rail crossings in Town to determine the improvements that need to be made to comply with the Federal Railroad Administration requirements. Some of the improvements could be made perhaps this summer while others, such as West Main Street, will require significantly more study time.

As it stands right now, no local Town funds would be required for any of the proposed improvements that would be recommended.

Updates on possible rail crossing improvements will be reported as they develop.

## • Upcoming Meeting Schedule

Due to several factors the next Town Council meeting will be held on Wednesday, February 22<sup>nd</sup>. Additionally, the Town Manager's proposed budget for FY18 will be presented to the Town Council on Thursday, March 2<sup>nd</sup> at 7:00 pm.

The March 6<sup>th</sup> regular meeting of the Town Council will be moved to Thursday, March 9<sup>th</sup> and combined with the Public Hearing on the Town Manager's proposed FY18 budget.

Budget work sessions of the Town Council will begin on Monday March 13<sup>th</sup>. All of these dates and times have been posted on the Town website calendar.

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# Amendment to Flood Damage Prevention Ordinance:

# 225-8. Basis for establishing areas of special flood hazard.

The areas of special flood hazard are identified by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) in its Flood Insurance Study (FIS) for, the Town of Plainville, effective

2/6/17 Page 7 of 8 September 26, 2008, which study with Hartford County, Connecticut, dated May 16, 2017, and accompanying Flood Insurance Rate Maps (FIRM), dated May 16, 2017 (Panels - 09003C0469G, 09003C0486G, 09003C0487G, 09003C0488G), and September 26, 2008, (Panels - 09003C0459F, 09003C0467F, 09003C0478F, 09003C0479F, 09003C0489F) and other supporting data applicable to the Town of Plainville, and subsequent revisions thereto, is adopted by reference and declared to be part of this chapter. Since mapping is legally adopted by reference into this chapter it must take precedence when more restrictive until such time as a map amendment or map revision is obtained from FEMA.
